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From Rev. Wendy

Shared ministry is not a term that we have used very often in this congregation, but it is something we do together, by whatever name. The word “minister” simply means “to serve.” We all serve one another here, through the sharing of our time, talents, and treasure. The professional minister is really a “minister among ministers.”

As co-ministers, we are not mere consumers of services. That is one of the very important ways that we are different from a yoga studio or a social club. James Luther Adams, preeminent UU theologian of the 20th century, referred to this idea of shared ministry within our UU tradition as the “priesthood and prophethood of all believers.”

We serve each other in many ways...

Keeping the building and the grounds maintained and kept-up and beautiful is a ministry.

Providing music for our communal worship is a ministry.

Providing religious education, faith formation, and growth and learning opportunities for children, youth and adults is a ministry.

Raising money to keep the lights on and heat the building and pay salaries for the professional minister and staff who serve with us is a ministry...counting and keeping track of it is, too.

Preparing worship services and hosting guest worship leaders is a ministry.

Collecting money, food, clothing and home goods and distributing them to those in need is a ministry... cooking a meal and sharing it with those who are hungry is, too.

Making and administering budgets and tending the financial well-being of the congregation is a ministry, as is providing the leadership and policies that keep us safe and moving forward together as a congregation.

Answering phone calls, responding to emails, making photocopies, preparing the weekly Order of Service and the monthly newsletter is a ministry.

Welcoming newcomers and integrating new members is a ministry.

Identifying and recruiting new leaders is a ministry.

Ushering, greeting, providing chancel decorations, food and coffee on Sunday mornings is a ministry.

Caring for those who are grieving or ill or recovering from surgery is a ministry.

Providing meals, helping shovel and rake leaves, moving kilns, installing sound system components...all of it is ministry

No one person can do all of that ministering alone. It takes a team.

There is no shortage of opportunities to minister here at the Harvard UU Church! In particular this month I'd like to call attention to the very important work of the Caring Committee, which coordinates meals, rides... sends cards, buys flowers, and occasionally visits with those who are sick, or recovering from medical procedures or who are otherwise in need of caring. Three of the members of this vital committee are completing their terms and the committee is in need of a few new people to join with those who are remaining on the committee. Faith Formation

The following reflection written by Kelley Taylor was shared with me and because it demonstrates so clearly some of the dilemmas and concern of parents in our faith formation program I felt it important to share with you. I hope you enjoy it as much as I did! Pam Reidy, DFF

A Perspective on Prayer by Kelley Taylor

It's 7:42am. The kids are finally in the car with their backpacks and lunchboxes. They are dressed – in something at least vaguely weather appropriate – and have at least two bites of breakfast in their bellies. I am waiting to hear the third seatbelt 'click'. When it finally sounds, I sigh audibly, turn on the kids' audio book and shift the car into drive. My mind is already racing ahead to my to-do list for the day.

Not two hundred feet out of the driveway I hear Christine (who is 5 years and 11 months and 2 days old – important details to her) say, rather loudly, "Mom, what does that word mean?"

I reach for my first sip of tea. "What word?" I ask.

"That word that Laura just used. Prayer," she says. Oh, boy. I really haven't had enough caffeine for this yet! I hope she gets distracted.

But, no. "MOM! It's not FAIR! All we do at bedtime is 'cuddle and talk' or 'rose/bud/thorn,'" she whines. "I want to do PRAYER at bedtime! Laura and Mary did that in *The Little House in the Big Woods* – why can't we?"

"Well," I start, praying that someone changes the subject. I fight with my parental instincts to insert some kernel of wisdom into the situation, and I ask what many self-respecting parents might ask. "What do you think it means?"

"I don't know," she says. And I wait. Then normalcy returns as she retreats to her usual pastime during our school commute. "Mom, speed limit 35!" Thank goodness she has returned to her obsessive tendency to read street signs.

That word percolates in her mind for a few days until she surprises me with it again at bedtime. "Don't forget, Mom. We need to do Prayers," she reminds me as I tuck her in. I'm a little more prepared at 7pm, though differently tired. "Tuck in and tell me what you're thinking," I begin.

"Well, I have to do prayers every night before bed," she explains. "And it has to look like this," as she shows me how to hold her hands together under her chin. "It's important to close your eyes, too."

"Oh, I see. Hmm. Where did you see this idea?" I inquire.

"On *Despicable Me*," she says matter-of-factly. "And then you wish for things."

"Oh, I see. Well," I begin, unable to let go of the image that just raced through my mind of my daughter growing up to be a miserly, self-absorbed spoiled brat. I have to intervene. "People think there are lots of different ways to pray. Sometimes people wish for things, sometimes they just sit quietly, sometimes they think of things they are thankful for—"

“No, no,” she interrupts. “I just want to wish. And you can’t watch. So, good night, mom,” she dismisses me cheerfully.

“Good night. I love you more than chocolate ice cream sundaes.”

Over the next few days, I resist the urge to ask her about her prayers; trying to show her the same respectful privacy I would expect other adults to show me about this very personal topic. The following week, however, she let me peek in a bit. She asked if I wanted to do prayers with her one night.

“Sure. Show me what to do,” I answer as I scoot up next to her at the head of the bed. She shows me how to hold my hands and close my eyes. Then she shares her wishes with me.

“I wish that school could be every day, and we can build lots of houses together, and there won’t be as much fighting, and that the whole world could become librarians, just like I want to do someday,” she says. “And don’t forget the last part, mom.”

“Hmm. What’s that?”

“Amen.” She said.

I walked away thinking how lucky I am that she is sharing this exploration of the word with me, that she feels safe and respected and valued enough to let me join her in her world for a moment. I was also relieved and in awe of the fact that she wasn’t just wishing for the latest fad toy or material possession for herself. I also felt so grateful because I know she has a community of people in her life that will meet her spiritual inquiries with similar respect. As uncomfortable as I myself might be with words like faith, prayer, and god, I, personally, am glad that we are using them in our church programs so my kids know that they can source information from more than just Laura Ingalls Wilder and *Despicable Me*. They also may actually help me sort through my own baggage around the terms and aide in my own spiritual journey.

For that I am thankful. And I’m also beginning to prepare myself for the day when she asks me about the god she hears about in “My Country ‘Tis of Thee” which she sings every day in school and will hear in the Girl Scout pledge when she joins Daisies. May I meet those questions with the same love and kindness. Amen.

Are You Interested in Traveling to Romania or Elsewhere with the UU Partner Church Council?

Congregational Pilgrimages have been the core offering of the UUPCC Pilgrimage Service since its inception in 1994. Our in-country experts work with groups as small as four to customize an itinerary that matches their interests, timeframe, pace, and overall travel goals. Most European pilgrimages combine 3 or 4 basic elements:

Unitarian religious and historical sites such as Kolozsvár, Torda, Gyulaféhevár, Székelyderzs, and Déva.

A stay with your partner congregation in their village or town (more about this later). For groups from unpartnered churches, we normally recommend a stay in a Unitarian village in order to experience - albeit briefly - the lives of many of our co-religionists.

Romanian & Transylvanian locations with broader tourist appeal such as Peles & Bran Castles in the Southern Carpathians, the Saxon fortress churches at Biertan and Viscri, the Saxon walled cities of Brasov (Brasso), Sighisoara (Segesvar), and Sibiu (Nagyszeben), the Painted Monasteries of Bucovina, and/or the Wooden Churches of Maramures.

A Central European capital city: Budapest, Vienna, and Prague are the most common.

The precise mix of these elements is determined by the group during the planning process. The specific locations visited are then shaped by other considerations such as European cities of arrival and departure. Most groups fly into and out of either Bucharest or Budapest. Many fly "open-jaw" routes. That is, they fly into one city and out of another. These tickets are usually only a few dollars more expensive and this has the advantage of avoiding retracing your steps. It is also possible to fly directly to Transylvania. There is increasing service at Cluj (Kolozsvár) - CLJ and Targu-Mures (Marosvasarhely) - TGM. Major airlines such as Luftansa, Austrian Air, Malev and other new discount airlines such as Wizzair serve these airports several times a week (not every day) from their hubs. If your time is limited, you may want to consider these airports in your flight plans. It will save you a much as a 2 travel days.

The duration of your stay with your partner congregation. 3-4 days is an average stay. If this is an introductory visit (your first time visiting your partners or the first time in a long time) then this is probably sufficient. However, if you have established strong friendships with members of your partner congregation or are planning a joint service project, then you may wish to stay longer. With longer stays, we typically program day trips to local sites of interest.

The overall duration of your trip. The average pilgrimage is 10-12 days, but we have programmed groups for as many as 18 days and as few as 5 days.

Congregational trips are easy to organize with our assistance! Group sizes range from 4 to 40 people and often include choir groups, partner church committees and friends of all ages. We work with each of group to customize an itinerary that meets their time frame and interests. We will help with all ground arrangements including hotels and home stays, meals, transportation, translators and guides. Here are some sample itineraries to help with your planning.
