Mark, My Word

It's almost October! It's hard to believe that summer has disappeared. Evenings are cool now, even chilly. It's noticeable that the daylight hours are a little shorter. All over New England the leaves are beginning to change color.

I'm very grateful for the warm welcome that Mickey (Michelle) and I have received at Harvard UU Church. As many of you already know, she lives and works in Maine as a social worker, working with people with mental health problems, and she will be with me about one weekend a month. I also visit her one weekend a month in Maine, and we talk on the phone every evening. So after 36 years of marriage we're "dating" for a while. We may be able to see more of one another after she retires at the end of June.

I've been asked to lead a "Blessing of the Animals" on Sunday, Oct. 4th, which is the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi in the Roman Catholic tradition. Francis was known for his love of nature and the environment, especially animals. He was also known as a supporter of greater social justice for poor people. I was heartened when the new Pope named himself for Francis of Assisi.

As animals in the sanctuary probably aren't a good idea, we're going to have our Oct. 4 inter-generational church service in Sutherland Hall.

I confess that this will be a new experience for me. I've never led a blessing of the animals, but I'm willing to try new experiences. And a farmer did bring a piglet to church one Sunday several years ago when I was serving in Castine, Maine. The piglet had been born prematurely, and he had it in a blanket and was nursing it with a bottle in the pew, while his wife was nursing their baby girl, Jane. I heard some squealing from that pew and I just thought Jane was simply being a bit noisier than usual. After church I learned that the squeals had come from a pig in a blanket. So I'm not entirely unfamiliar with animals in church.

I'll be talking about Unitarianism on Sunday, Sept. 27, and Universalism on Sunday, Oct. 11. I'll recount a bit of how Unitarians and Universalists came to be, and how the Methodist church helped convert me to Unitarianism and Universalism. This may be a good primer for newcomers, and a refresher for long-time members.

The summer baseball season is heading toward its culmination in the World Series (oddly named, since only U.S. teams, and one Canadian team, are eligible). As I write in September, I can confidently say that the Red Sox will not be in this year's World Series. Although that is a disappointment, it leads me to think about imperfection. In three of the past four seasons the Red Sox have been in last place, but in that other year they won the World Series. Yet to Boston area fans, the Red Sox are heroes. And if a batter hits on base one time out of three, he's a superstar. All people are imperfect, but baseball teaches us that we can strike out two times out of three, and still be pretty darn good. That leads me to my sermon of Oct. 18, which will be on the topic, "The Beauty of Imperfection."

One of my favorite things so far about HUUC is the wonderful music program. Ted Johnson and his music are an inspiration! And we have other fine musicians, including John Chapman and Eleanor Toth, and a wonderful choir. I'm enjoying singing in the choir, and am looking forward to seeing you in church.

The 2015-2016 church school year: a letter to all parishioners

The new church year brings many changes to how our church will be running its programs for youth and children. There are new approaches to organization and leadership, new curricula for the children, and much more.

But let's begin with the foundation of it all: our covenant as a religious community. We hold ourselves, as a community, responsible for the religious education of our children. If ever there was a year for it, in this year of many changes, we fling open the doors of the Fellowship Building, and welcome all parishioners to find that piece of spiritual growth that comes from teaching our children. We welcome parents of school-age children and non-parents alike. Our co-operative program has a role for all of you, be it classroom guest, lesson leader, or volunteer.

So, what's different this year? First, we are operating without a formal Director of Faith Formation (DFF/DRE). This decision was arrived at by leadership of the church, along with veterans of the church school program. While this is partly a result of the unexpected departure of our former DFF, it is also – in fact principally – a deliberate choice that has allowed us to rethink how we run our programs for children and youth.

Organizationally, we have done away with a plethora of prior committees, and replaced them with a single Faith Formation team. The team is charged with implementing the church vision of a continuum of religious education spanning nursery through high school. The team has been meeting all summer to design a fabulous religious education program for our children, and to lay out the specifics of how it will be delivered.

While the team has stepped up to address the educational facets of a DFF/DRE's responsibilities, we have also hired parishioner Lorrie Clark as a Faith Formation administrator to support the team with the nuts and bolts of running the program.

Turning to our educational programs, another change this year is a new breakdown of age groups. To do justice to the actual age distribution of our youth and children, we have added a class for grades 5 and 6 (the Cosmics), and have adjusted the age groupings for the middle- and high-school youth groups.

The Glean Team is a group of more than 60 volunteers whose mission it is to reduce food waste, combat local hunger, raise community awareness and increase the availability of local produce at food pantries. Five days each week we pick up food from Roche Brother's in Acton that would otherwise be thrown away and donate it to Loaves and Fishes food pantry, WHEAT's food pantry in Clinton and Transitions at Devens (a temporary shelter for women and their children). In addition, during the harvest season, we pick up food weekly from Applefield Farm in Stow. We also glean food from fields and orchards whenever we are invited by the local farmers to do so. Gleaning is fun and gives folks a tremendous sense of satisfaction from making a simple vet concrete difference in people's lives.
