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## **From Rev. Wendy**

I recently heard the story of Virunga, a national park in the Congo, which is home to the critically endangered Mountain Gorilla. In and around the park there are many competing forces that co-exist. There are the Congolese park rangers who risk their lives, literally, to save the gorillas. There are rebels who live and subsist in the park, in part by poaching gorillas for profit. And there are representatives from a British oil company (with American executives), which has begun illegally exploring for oil.

At the end program, one of the people interviewed says emphatically that everyone should care about what is going on in this park, even if we live half a world away, because if a multinational corporation can encroach upon the oldest national park in the world, which is a world heritage site protected by international agreement, nothing on earth will be safe.

This is another story about “the Commons,” of course, and about the way in which private interests often seek their own enrichment (and that of their shareholders) through the diminishment of what has been held in common for the benefit of all. In his book of essays titled *Our Common Wealth: The Hidden Economy that Makes Everything Else Work*, Jonathan Rowe writes says there are three types of commons (at least) that we rely on for sustenance and life: natural, social, and temporal.

We need a natural commons – water, air, trees, and land, for example. We need a social commons, which includes community, language, culture, as well as roads and bridges. And we need a temporal commons – “a pool of time available for work outside the market.” This is the space in which we care for one another, serve our neighbors and friends, and attend to the work of the community. It is also, I would add, the time we have available to renew our bodies, minds and spirits, so essential to our health and wholeness.

Over the last several decades, our time has also been increasingly encroached upon by the market, which has led to the diminishment of our communities, including our churches, and to the decline of our emotional and spiritual health. As Rowe says, “We need to protect our time as well as our waters and wilderness. We also need ways to channel nonmarket time into constructive uses.”

Note that he said “constructive,” not “productive.” We are so well trained by the economy in which we live to want to be productive all the time, even in our “free time,” many of us have a hard time remembering how to rest. Constructive time is time used to build up – to build up our relationships, our communities, our spirits.

We are about to enter a very busy and demanding season. I would encourage all of you to try to reclaim some of your time for constructive rather than productive purposes. And I would invite you to begin by taking some time for your own renewal, to sit still and breathe. Here at the church there will be opportunities for meditation on Sunday afternoons at 4pm on November 30, December 7, and December 14.

I will also be offering 3 Vespers services on Wednesday evenings from 7-8pm on December 3, December 10, and December 17. “Vespers” is a word that simply means “evening” and these will Vespers services will be very simple, informal opportunities to gather for quiet worship with some music, some readings, a prayer, some sharing, and lots of quiet reflection. I hope you’ll join me for one or all of these Wednesday evenings to help renew your mind and spirit.

I wish for you that your holiday season, from Thanksgiving through the New Year, is filled with an abundance of love, health, and wholeness! See you in church!

## ... *Waiting* ...

It seems, for me at least, that the ability to wait patiently or joyfully or without anxiety is intimately connected to what I am waiting for. Like most people as a child, I thought Christmas would never come. As a college student, I thought graduation was an eternity away, and yes as a mother, sometimes the distance between my thinking and my son's seems endless.

I am much better at waiting for things that take a long time. As a teacher I always had room in my heart to wait for a teenager to grow out of an immature thought or a habit; but waiting in the line at the grocery store is quite a different story.

I once had a really funny, but frightful thought related to waiting... "What if my eternal judgment were based solely on my how I wait in traffic?" Oh, dear, I would certainly be condemned to places unknown... I have no patience in traffic! Thinking seriously for a moment though, I knew I had to change my conduct in traffic, where I was more impatient than anywhere else in life.

Something magical happened, I started to *use the time* in traffic differently and the time went by so much more quickly. My anxiety waiting in traffic simply melted away. I started to imagine what the life of the person in the car ahead of me might be like. Had she a child in the hospital she was trying to get to, was she punching a time clock and late for work, was it her first day back to work after burying her mother? Of course, probably none of these were true, and she most probably was just as impatient as I was, but my musings opened me to think more about the person in the car ahead or behind me. What started as a game became a habit of compassionately thinking of the other person. Therein was my opportunity to change *how* I was waiting. What I do while I am waiting makes all the difference and yes, it makes a difference to those around me too. Imagine the impact if we smile broadly at the flustered person in the checkout line ahead of us rather than sighing rudely at them?

As we reflect this month on waiting for the miraculous wonder of Christmas generosity, peace on earth, or the eternal flame of hope amid violence, we have the chance to wait with each other in a very different way. We are a community, we are a family, in this church we have a common vision of how we wait and what we wait for, but more importantly we are committed to waiting *with* each other, let us do so with compassion.

December 21: 5 p.m.


