Meister Eckhart was a Catholic monk, scholar, and mystic who lived during the end of the 13th century and the beginning of the 14th. He saw God in the stuff of earth, in real life, in every moment. Recently, I came again upon one of his poems, as translated by Daniel Ladinsky. It is titled, simply, “Love Does That.”

All day long a little burro labors, sometimes
with heavy loads on her back and sometimes just with worries
about things that bother only
burros.

And worries, as we know, can be more exhausting
than physical labor.

Once in a while a kind monk comes
to her stable and brings
a pear, but more
than that,

he looks into the burro’s eyes and touches her ears

and for a few seconds the burro is free
and even seems to laugh,

because love does
that.

Love frees.

Often in our lives we are faced with situations that leave us wishing we could do more to help others. Loving is doing, as our children have been learning this year. But no one of us ever has to do it all. We only have to do what we can do, no matter how small or insignificant our contributions seem. As Mother Theresa taught, “Not all of us can do great things. Report from the Board

Board's Objectives for the Year

Under the church's governing by-laws the Board is required to define its specific governance objectives for the year and end the year by reporting to the Congregation its progress toward these objectives.

The objectives we have set for ourselves this year are as follows:

1) Financial Strategy Task Force

Create, appoint members, and determine the charge to a Financial Strategy Task Force. The charge of the Task Force is to assess the current and recent state of the Church's finances, including persistent shortfalls in the annual operating budget over the past several years, and present a report of its findings to the Board. The Task Force will also propose options for improving the Church's financial position in the short, intermediate and long term. As the Board considers vision and strategic planning for the Church, the information provided by the Financial Strategy Task Force will assist the board and congregation in making informed decisions about the future of the Church.

2) Committee Charters

It has been nearly ten years since there has been a thorough review and documentation of the roles of the major church committees and, in particular, each committee's role with respect to the Board, the staff, and the Congregation. Our starting point is to work with four committees: Buildings & Grounds, Membership/Welcoming, Caring and Social Action. This is not about the Board telling the committees what to do, but rather our objective is to more fully understand what we should be expecting of one another as different, but critical parts of a largely volunteer organization. To ensure the smooth functioning of our organization, we believe this idea of roles and boundaries is worth fully exploring, and subsequently documenting our mutual understandings.

3) All Leadership Meetings

About three times a year a meeting is called of the chairs of each of the various committees. Traditionally this meeting has been chaired by the Vice President. But what, beyond information sharing, is the purpose of this meeting? Our objective is to create a description of the role and purpose of the All Leadership Meetings to assure there is common understanding and expectations among the lay leadership.

4) Envisioning Our Future—Getting Unstuck

Despite many years, even decades, of attempts, the congregation and its leadership have yet to articulate a vision of the church's immediate and mid-range future *that is specific enough to guide programmatic and financial direction and decisions*. Our objectives: to understand why our past processes have ultimately proved inadequate in this regard and to determine a course of action that will allow the Board and the church to better plan and move forward effectively and with confidence.

As a Board, we look forward to working on these items and keeping you apprised of our progress along the way.

Anybody Can Serve

Last Sunday, while the church school children were setting up the “Dogstravaganza” fundraising event in the FB entry, 13 middle school youth were planning for the Indoor Yard Sale, to follow through on their commitment to raise an annual total of \$600 to support two high school students in Cambodia. Adults engaged in the Partakers ministry program reflected on their experiences in the sanctuary, and choir members sang. Another team of adults pulled warm dishes out of the ovens in the FB kitchen for the pot luck lunch. Others opened their hearts and wallets to buy items or make cash donations for America’s VetDogs program, and/or gave during the offering to support the Partakers program. While all this was going on in Harvard, seven Senior High youth (and one SHYG alum) and their four adult companions, were wrapping up their Hurricane Sandy relief trip. And one woman sat in the church foyer with a dog who had brought herself to church without human companionship until the dog was retrieved by Animal Control (and reunited with her family).

And that’s just an accounting of the things I was aware of, on a single Sunday morning at HUUC. I am sure there were others!

The Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., said: “Everybody can be great... because anybody can serve.” And it’s been my experience and observation that serving makes a person feel great, too! In the next few weeks, our children will encounter stories of other kids who have done great service, and put their own hands to the assembly of hygiene boxes for people in need in our greater community. The Middle and High School youth will reflect on their service activities, and plan for future service projects.

From the youngest to the oldest among us, may this continue to be a community growing in greatness through the many ways we serve.

February's Sunday Sharing Our Plate collection will be donated to Partner Church. Please make checks payable to HUUC with "Partner Church Council" in the memo line.

In far off Andrasfalva, Romania, Harvard has a partner church. The partner church association was originally started in 1920 after World War I, but World War II and the Cold War aborted it until 1989 the brutal dictator, Ceausescu, was assassinated. Our partner church building in Andrasfalva was started in '95 and dedicated in '99. The building is shared with the Calvinists of the town. Unitarian services are held there one week out of four. The people of the Transylvanian plateau are mainly farmers, cowherds, and shepherds with an occasional teacher, charcoal maker, museum director, and minister included. There is no great wealth there but they valiantly struggle to keep their churches going.

Our partner church relationship is now 22 years old - the Magyarandrásfalva church was built with our help. Our donations will help them make needed repairs and maintenance to keep their house of worship a welcoming place.

The members of the Social Action committee are Georgia Sassen, Dave Andrew, Janice Goodell, Chris Ready, and Pat Westwater-Jong. We meet monthly and are actively seeking new members to help in organizing and sponsoring new programs. Please contact any member for more information.


