Are you looking for a way...

To get to know a few others more deeply and to build stronger connections within the church?

To explore big questions and topics and your own beliefs in a safe environment?

To speak from your heart and be really, attentively listened to and heard by others?

To listen to and learn from the experience of others?

To feel more connected to your church and to your faith?

To enrich and strengthen your community by performing acts of kindness alongside others from the church?

If you answered YES to any or all of these questions, then our newly developing “Circle of Kindness” Small Group Ministry might be for you!

In general, small groups provide opportunities to reflect on and discuss significant life topics. They provide opportunities to get to know other people and to get to know yourself better, as well. Over time, they allow participants to build deep connections with one another, with the congregation, and with that which is sacred.

No matter what the topic, the conversation is always respectful and caring. In each session, participants have an opportunity to share their perspectives, tell their stories, and listen deeply to one another. Group meetings begin and end with centering readings, and include a brief silence, followed by sharing. Many groups engage in service projects, putting their faith into action. The “service” focus and intention of this particular group will be on how we can, as individuals and as a group, share small (random or not) acts of kindness in order to enrich and strengthen our communities and expand our “circle of kindness” in the world around us.

So far, a few people have expressed interest in the group, but not yet enough for the group to begin meeting. We still need 5-6 others. Are you one of them? Please contact me if you are interested and/or want more information. Ideally, we will meet once a month beginning in November, day and time to be determined by the group.

From the Board

October 2014

The Board has met three times this year and we have been busy developing our team and establishing our 2014-2015 objectives. A key outcome of our year so far has been the selection of our objectives for the year. This is always a challenging and interesting discussion and process. From Promise to Abundance and the Common Good

With November right around the corner, we change the worship theme of *Covenant* to that of *Abundance/Wealth and The Common Good/Commonweal*. It strikes me that keeping covenant typically creates abundance and is always related to the common good.

During October the young people of the congregation learned about the promises reflected in our UU principles. We learned that the principles are more than nice words, they are lifestyle commitments. It is always enlightening to hear young people speak about the promises they make and break. Children take promise keeping very seriously, because they know in their hearts what it feels like to be on the receiving end of a broken promise. Discussions with the RE kids revealed that they, like us, sometimes find it hard to keep an agreement or a promise. They realize, as we do, that when we have failed someone, we have a duty to say we are sorry, move on and try once again to do our best.

As members of the Harvard UU community we are covenanted through the principles, our mission statement and a deep promise to be supportive of each other's spiritual journey. When we honor this covenant, we are routinely and intrinsically involved with each other to create the common good. But what is the common good? What happens when there are differences among us in defining the common good? What happens when our abundance or lack of it separates us from the common good? These are some of the challenging questions we will explore in the Faith Formation programs in November as we share in visits from members of our congregation of 60+ years to talk about their lives for the common good, as we listen to our high schoolers share their experience of the Dominican Republic and even as we learn a grace before meals sung daily in Creole by 600 boys at an orphanage in Haiti. Middle schoolers will begin their yearlong commitment to the *Heifer Project* as they grow in understanding how they fit into the web of life. High Schoolers will share their abundance and learn directly about the common good through their *CityReach* participation while *Coming of Age* participants listen to a panel of people talk about their spiritual beliefs, convictions, doubts and journey.

Dorothy Day was an American journalist and social activist. In the 1930s, Day worked closely with fellow activist Peter Maurin to establish the Catholic Worker movement, a nonviolent, pacifist movement that continues to combine direct aid for the poor and homeless with nonviolent direct action on their behalf. As I begin my own reflection on the connections between covenant, abundance and the common good I start with some of her wisest words, "The best things to do with the best things in life is to give them away."

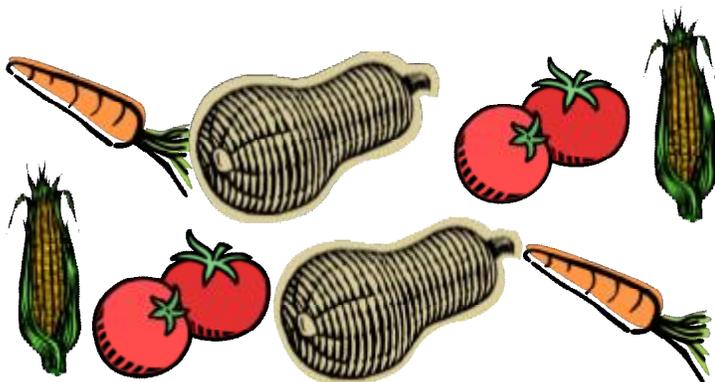

A Day in the Life of a Gleaner

About a month ago, the Glean Team was invited to glean butternut squash from a local organic farm. Five hearty women gleaners in work boots, jeans and rain gear were able to help out on that drizzly Tuesday. Once we had all arrived, we were told that we could glean tomatoes as well as squash and were shown exactly where we could pick. We got to work filling our bins and within about an hour and fifteen minutes, we were done with the harvesting and only had the loading of the cars to do. With two people carrying each bin, we finished up quickly and headed back to the farm stand where we knew we had more food to pick up. This particular farm puts aside food weekly for us that they are unable to sell because it is either slightly imperfect or is simply left over from their farmer's market days. One of the farmhands helped us load those boxes, bins and bags of produce which included potatoes, corn, peppers, lettuce, carrots and other vegetables into our cars. With three cars about as full as they could get, we left to deliver the food -- two cars to Loaves and Fishes and one to WHEAT. I drove one of the cars headed to Loaves and Fishes, where there were many people available to help us unload the food at the loading dock. We then moved the vegetables from the Glean Team bins into Loaves and Fishes boxes so that we could take our crates back with us. After the unloading was completed, Loaves and Fishes weighed the food, as it does for all food that is received from farms and grocery stores. I knew that we had just unloaded a lot of food but even I was truly amazed to learn that we had just delivered over 1,000 pounds of vegetables! Assuming that the car that dropped off food to WHEAT had an equal amount of food, I am guessing that we gleaned approximately 1,500 pounds in three hours. A truly awesome day...

City Reach

The Groton UU Church has invited us to join their group participating in CityReach this November 14 & 15.

CityReach is an overnight urban outreach program begun in March 1996 for youth (with accompanying adults), young adults, and college students from churches of any denomination. The program gives these young people the opportunity to learn first-hand about homelessness from people who have experienced it. During the 20-hour session, participants join CityReach staff in street ministry and offer hospitality, food and clothing. This is followed by times of sharing and reflection.

The program starts on Friday evening, November 14, at 7 pm and ends on Saturday afternoon, November 15. Participants arrive and are addressed by staff on Friday evening who are experiencing or have experienced homelessness. Participants walk through the city guided by members of Common Cathedral and end the evening with a simple worship service. They sleep in the sanctuary of St. Paul's Cathedral. On Saturday morning, participants offer clothing that they have collected and a simple meal to homeless people in the Cathedral's basement. They then form teams for street outreach, taking sandwiches and clothes to people at South Station, Copley Square, Boston's waterfront and other sites. All then eat lunch and reflect together about their experiences in light of the Gospel, write a prayer, and talk about next steps for them personally and/or as a group.

The Groton church has done this for a number of years and they have invited our SHYG to join them. I will be going along with some youth. There are a few more spaces available if you might be interested in participating.
