What Does It Mean To Be A People Of Journey?

It has become popular in our society to talk about spiritual journeys as a process of living into your full or true self. That's a helpful frame and yet I think it is more complicated. We also have to untangle ourselves from identities we have been given or the ones within which we are stuck. When I look back on my journey, several poems mark my way. I remember Mary Oliver's poem "The Journey" like it was just yesterday when it seemed these words were written just for me:

One day you finally knew what you had to do, and began, though the voices around you kept shouting their bad advice --though the whole house began to tremble and you felt the old tug at your ankles. "Mend my life!" each voice cried. But you didn't stop. You knew what you had to do.

So began my journey as a minister, and thanks to the part-time option at Andover Newton Theological School, I completed a three-year degree in just six years, balancing classwork, a part-time job as a watershed advocate and mothering four elementary age kids. Once at seminary, another poem by Wendell Berry, "Be Not Ashamed" helped me untangle myself from the non-religious identity of my birth family to claim a religious one. I recited these words by heart to my Poets and Prophets class during my first semester.

You will be walking some nights in the comfortable dark of your yard and suddenly a great light will shine round about you, and behind you will be a wall you never saw before. It will be clear suddenly... you misread the complex instructions, you are not a member, you lost your card or never had one. There is no power against them, only candor, only an inward clarity, unashamed. When their questions are asked, say to them: "I am not ashamed," and a sure horizon will come around you. The heron will begin his evening flight from the hilltop.

Since then, Derek Walcott's words "Feast on your life," have guided me. Do you know this poem, "Love After Love?"

The time will come when, with elation you will greet yourself arriving at your own door, in your own mirror and each will smile at the other's welcome, and say, sit here. Eat. You will love again the stranger who was yourself. Give wine. Give bread. Give back your heart to itself, to the stranger who has loved you. Take down the love letters from the bookshelf, the photographs, the desperate notes, peel your own image from the mirror. Sit. Feast on your life.

More recently, I find myself reflecting on Stanley Kunitz poem, "The Layers."

I see the milestones dwindling toward the horizon...Yet I turn, I turn, exulting somewhat, with my will intact to go wherever I need to go, with every stone on the road precious to me.

This gift of both being and becoming is precious. Made possible by our engaging theology and by congregations like ours that offer sanctuaries of kindness and hugs of tenderness along the way. Untangling ourselves is not always easy. What and who marks the milestones of your journey? Take a few moments and share with one another, and if you want to go deeper, join us for a three-session workshop, "Starting/Restarting Point" beginning February 24th after the worship service.

From the Co-Presidents of the Board ...

As a reminder, the mission statement for our church is:

Love is the spirit of our church, where we gather to worship and to create a welcoming and nurturing religious community of all ages and where we:

- ♦ Are inspired to explore, reflect, and grow spiritually;
- ♦ Support and care for one another;
- ♦ Respect our diversity and seek to understand our differences;
- ♦ Are safe to share our deeply held thoughts and values;
- ♦ Support individual and collective service to the larger community;
- ♦ Celebrate together our traditions and our lives, with all their sorrows and joys.

We hold ourselves responsible for the religious education of our children and ourselves, to carry out our mission, and to support our church.

We share our mission because one of the board's charges by the by-laws is to support the mission of the church. Our activities to discuss this month are aligned to mission and we share how below.

The board began work on our first Faithful Experiment in September, asking: How might we enhance our connections to church community and our youth, while also eliminating some of our pain points around hospitality? **How this aligns to our mission and values: We seek to make hospitality more spiritually rewarding and mission centered.** For five weeks, we trained the youth to run hospitality with the goal that we would see the youth more (traditionally, our youth do not attend services in middle and high school) and ease the burden of hospitality on our adult volunteers. After the five week experiment, we handed hospitality back to the congregation with a promise to follow up with a survey. We've now seen hospitality run a variety of ways, so please take 5 minutes to share your thoughts. We'll share the results of the survey in a few weeks and make a decision about how to proceed with hospitality. You may access the survey at: <http://tinyurl.com/huuc-hospitality>

After service on February 17, the board facilitated a discussion about how we use our spaces. We'll type up the notes and hand them over to our Building and Rental Committees for continued discussions. Among the many ideas that came up, some takeaways from the discussion:

- ♦ We value having a space above the sanctuary to give parents of young children a place to enjoy the service when their children are too active to sit downstairs. Next steps: Add a rug to provide better soundproofing, as well as an automatic closer on the doors to the balcony, again for soundproofing. A future goal might be to broadcast the service on a flat screen TV so that the service could be seen as well as heard. **How this aligns to our mission and values: We want to provide a welcoming environment to families with young children and the space upstairs is more welcoming than the area above the admin office.**
- ♦ We value having a flexible, multi-use space in the sanctuary building. Some of the identified needs were: storage of music, choir director's office, large table for projects such as organizing music folders, private meeting space, opportunities for more creative worship (a trend in other UU churches) where some people might move upstairs to work on an art project or engage in a small group discussion. **How this aligns to our mission and values: We support the ministry that music provides our congregation, so we want to honor their desire for flexible space. We also respect our diverse preferences around worship and honor that some people enjoy traditional services, while others enjoy more experimental and interactive ways of worship. Creating space—both mental and physical—for everyone to have their preferences met some of the time in worship, is a mission-driven action.**
- ♦ We also talked about the classrooms in Fellowship Hall and how they aren't typically used Monday–Saturday. We brainstormed many ideas about improving their use—renting to a small school, renting to after school tutors, offering a room to a non-profit with a short term need. This began a larger conversation about possibilities that will need to be continued. **How this aligns to our mission and values: Our church makes our spaces available to many people in our larger community and it is worth talking about the spaces that might provide more opportunities.**

Here we hold ourselves responsible for the religious education of our children and ourselves, to carry out our mission, and to support our church.

Thank you to my DRE predecessors over the last 12 years: Lynn Crowley, Daniel Payne, Pam Reidy, Melinda Green, and Liza Spisto. Each has added value and their own personal touch to the RE program, and have brought it to where it is today.

I'd also like to appreciate our RE teachers who have made things happen for the past few months by organizing lessons, teaching our youth, welcoming newcomers to the program. These include Shane, Sarah, Jesh, Tony, Danielle, Norman, Shannon, Piali, Cheryl, Tim, Lisa, Suzie, Greg, Donnalisa, Kerry, and myself—and a special thanks to Sarah for keeping things running.

What's Happening in RE

January's RE focus was gratitude. The month began with the Butterfly and Rock Garden children, together with Rev. Jill, watching the WOW in the World podcast on being grateful. We then created a "tree" decorated with leaves—each carrying our own message of thanks.

Throughout January, the Butterflies (ages 5-8) learned lessons of gratitude through Spirit Play stories, had a Sunday outdoors—enjoying a UU scavenger



hunt and toasted marshmallows, and celebrated Martin Luther King day. The Rocks (ages 9-11) bonded over a new tradition of being served tea, and later made and served snacks to the Butterflies. We learned from Kerry Alexander, chair of the Caring Committee, about bees and how it's essential that they work together in community.

For the Rocks, we discussed the Zen story, *It will pass*—where a student is unhappy and feels failure, and the teacher says, "It will pass." With time, the student reports happiness and success. The teacher's response is also "It will pass." The kid-driven "big" questions we talked about included: Why does failing feel so bad? If you never succeed, are you actually failing? Why do we get in trouble when we make mistakes? What makes us keep trying? The idea is to encourage deep thinking about life's challenges, while we connect with each other.

Building Bridges has 12 members attending Our Whole Lives (OWL), while several more have been involved in preparing soup, cornbread, and brownies for Transitions at Devens' families. As part of exploring world religions, the BB's are learning about the Israeli-Palestine conflict.

Senior High Youth Group has been planning their church service for Sunday, March 10. They will be sharing their stories, while actively inspiring us each to take action for change.

February's theme of trust, along with our church's yearlong focus on the idea of sanctuary, had the Butterflies, Rocks, and BB's (those who are not in OWL), working on social action. We decorated and packed Valentine's Day goodie bags and provided 12 meals of soup, cornbread, and brownies for Transitions at Devens—families in need who are also in transition. The Rocks also prepared veggies and dip for the church's Hungarian Supper. An exploration of keeping your place musically in a song is planned to show how we can trust ourselves.
